- As a founding member and Treasurer of the Florida WCA Chapter I have spoken at and worked with countless number of Florida churches seeking disaffiliation. Knowing the concerns and hopes of laity and churches through-out the Conference, I will be able to represent them well.
- In 2020, I served on the Global WCA's Connectional Funding Taskforce that established a funding model for what would become the GMC.
- I served incognito on the Florida Transitional Conference Advisory Team (TCAT) which formed the Florida Conference of the GMC.
- Currently serve on the Florida Conference GMC's Finance Committee.
- Currently serve as the leader of the SEJ Chapter of the WCA and serve on the Global WCA Council. I'm acutely aware to the needs in our Central Conferences who hope one day to find a home in the GMC. As a delegate to the GMC General Conference I will work to provide a home for them in the GMC.
- I am serving on the GMC's Commission on Finance, Administration, Pensions, and Benefits giving me a greater knowledge of the general church's financial issues.

#### 4. Describe your passion and fruit for sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Coming out of a Charismatic UMC Church (Bayshore) and attending Asbury (Wilmore) I had to fight to get into the UMC. I've ended up having to work, just as hard, to get out of the UMC. I use that same passionate spirit to reach folks for Jesus. My 35 plus years of pastoral ministry has been fruitful and fulfilling in growing the church and reaching people for Jesus. ## 1. How do you understand the purpose of the Global Methodist Church?

#### 1. How do you understand the purpose of the Global Methodist Church?

We have made it through disaffiliation praise be to God. Our next challenge will be addressing the reality that our movement remains markedly older than the national average. I am serving as the current vice-chair of the Florida GMC Board of Ministry, with primary task of helping develop and refine our new ordination process for this first and future classes of ordinands.

I served as a member of the Florida TCAT as we worked toward becoming a provisional annual conference and was one of the first clergy to officially transfer into Florida Global Methodism as one of the six officers listed on the initial incorporation documents.

I participated in a year long WCA sponsored 'Exponential' learning cohort with Methodist leaders from across the country including a handful that are now serving as President Pro Temp or as Presiding Elders in their respective conferences. We gathered to learn from some of the most effective disciple making churches around the country that we might recover our roots of multiplication as a forming denomination.

I have been formed by a family has been shaped by the renewal/revival side of Methodism. My (almost 93 year old) grandfather came to faith at the 1950 Asbury revival, and my uncle recently led his church into the new formed Allegheny West conference of the GMC. I am here today because of generations of faithful evangelical Methodists and want the same for my children.

#### 4. Describe your passion and fruit for sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

I have experienced a profound transformation of my identity, purpose, and life by the grace of God through the church. I want everyone to have the opportunity to experience the same new life God invites us into. The local church remains the primary medium the Gospel of Jesus is shared. # 1. How do you understand the purpose of the Global Methodist Church?

We hold in common a purpose and mission with all other Christian traditions: Make disciples of Jesus Christ. I understand the unique purpose of the Global Methodist Church as continuing within a long line of churches and traditions to honor our Methodist heritage but doing so as a new denomination with greater clarity around core beliefs and practices, and with greater accountability to one another in how we do our life together.

# 2. In your opinion, what is the most important thing the General Conference needs to accomplish to be considered as a success?

The General Conference needs to discern and affirm a way of organizing our life together as Global Methodists that (1) is faithful to orthodox Christianity; (2) is connectional in nature; (3) develops the smallest bureaucratic footprint necessary; (4) ensures great flexibility for local churches to serve their communities; and (5) provides a clear pathway and process for holding one another accountable to what we believe and how we should live.

# 3. Describe some experiences that will be an advantage to your work as a General Conference delegate.

My Doctor of Ministry project at Fuller Theological Seminary focused on discipleship systems for local churches, so I've done a lot of research on church ministry systems and processes. (Key idea: Systems produce exactly what they were designed to produce, so if you're not getting the output you want, look at the system as well as the inputs.) I was a member of C12 Group for almost ten years, which offered me a high level of training and coaching in leadership and administration from a business perspective. These experiences, along with my experience in re-engineering ministry systems in large churches, will be advantageous to the work of a founding General Conference.

# 4. Describe your passion and fruit for sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

From the moment I invited Christ into my life at the age of 16 at a youth group lock-in, I've had a passion for helping people to know just how much God loves them and wants to be in a personal relationship with them. Every person needs the love, forgiveness, grace, and mercy of God to be a reality in his or her life. The gift of salvation and the presence and power of God's Spirit is available to everyone, anywhere, regardless of who they are or what they've done. This is the Gospel, and when hearts are changed, then lives are changed, and those changed lives overflow into the lives of others. Truly Good News!

#### 1. How do you understand the purpose of the Global Methodist Church?

I see the Global Methodist Church as an opportunity to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land as the early Methodists set out to do. It is a movement focused on being led by the Holy Spirit and the Holy Scriptures that is intentional about sharing the good news of Jesus. We have a treasure in earthen vessels, and a great commission that calls us to share it. We are a revivalist, evangelistic, and mission focused movement and I am excited for what God will do through us.

#### 2. In your opinion, what is the most important thing the General Conference needs to accomplish to be considered as a success?

This General Conference has the opportunity to set the course for the immediate future. The most important thing, therefore, is to pray and listen for God's voice so that we might follow His path forward. As the movement grows and leadership expands, having this foundation in prayer, and a clarity in mission are vital. I think we also need to ensure that proper guardrails are in place so that we might keep our focus on the mission of the church and not allow secondary things to take on more importance than they should. It will be important to set in place how the mission will be emphasized, supported, and taught through each level of our structure (conferences, bishops, presiding elders, local church, membership) and then how the mission defines our connection and affiliation with other movements (denominations) within the Christian faith and ministry partners (seminaries, mission organizations, etc...). I think we also need to be aware that everything that needs to happen will not happen at General Conference and that as we build, grow, and learn together, there will be more structural work to do. This is why having that solid foundation about who we are and what we are about brought to bear on each part of our structure is necessary for this first gathering.

#### 3. Describe some experiences that will be an advantage to your work as a General Conference delegate.

My first church job was a custodian. I later served as a youth pastor. Finally, I felt the call to Ordained Ministry. As a pastor I have served at a small rural church, been an Associate Pastor at a large church, and now serve at a medium sized church. I think I can understand the variety of needs for a variety of churches, but more importantly I understand people are people just in different contexts. I also believe my experiences in mission, working with people from different countries and cultures will be beneficial as a delegate. I think this work has helped me to become a good listener both to people and to God.

Currently I serve on the Board for the Methodist Children's Home (new branding coming soon) which is beneficial to understanding organizational connections and working with others to accomplish a mission in a changing world. I also am on the Board of Ministry for the Florida Conference, which helps me to better understand the requirements for clergy candidates and the needs of churches in our state.

Having led my church through the disaffiliation process, I can relate with many of the struggles that others have experienced, as well as the hope for what is to come. At my current appointment, we are also working through the rebuilding process from Hurricane Ian, so I am learning the ins and outs of insurance, government processes, and how to rebuild a church. I think more than anything I have had to learn how to trust in God, listen for His voice, and rely on the Holy Spirit to do the transformational work that only the Spirit can do. I believe these experiences have worked together to prepare me for the work that lies ahead within the General Conference, our Annual Conference, or whatever God leads me to next.

#### 4. Describe your passion and fruit for sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Jesus makes a difference! I believe that an encounter with Jesus is the only thing that is truly transformative in a person's life, and that believing in Jesus is the only way to salvation and reconciliation with the Father. Sharing the good news of Jesus, and leading others to tell the story of what Jesus has done for them, has to be the priorities of the church. At my current appointment I have been emphasizing the importance of telling our God stories so that we can normalize conversational evangelism. We are training people how to point others to the light of Jesus.

I wish I could say that I have been able to lead hundreds of people to Christ, but that hasn't happened yet. For now, the fruit of this passion is found in congregation members who come back and tell me how they overcame their fear, followed the Holy Spirit's promptings, and shared Jesus with somebody. I and others in my congregation have been better able to share Jesus with people because we recognize the importance. We have also become more in tune with listening for the Holy Spirit so that we can speak and act when God leads us to share Jesus through word and action.

Trained and participated in the Truth and Reconciliation meetings in South Africa after President Mandela was elected. Ministered in refugee camps during the Mozambique civil war and helped in medical missions and in training indigenous missioners to minister to the refugees and facilitated and taught in Bible School/ Seminary extension classes to 4 different tribal groups. In Jamaica, West Indies I served two circuits and was Circuit Superintendent. In returning to USA, I served as clergy to two churches, eventually serving in extension ministry as Senior Chaplain for Vitas Healthcare. Now pastoring a new church start in Port St Lucie. I believe my diverse background in ministry and my theological training in which I concentrated on Missiology would be as asset as a delegate.

# **4.** Describe your passion and fruit for sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Mission and outreach has been the focus of my life and ministry from the mid 1970's. Overseas, I had opportunity to pastor churches, establish new faith

communities, facilitate community development projects to help people, establish bible school/seminary training to hundreds of individuals in both South Africa/ Botswsana and the Caribbean. The fruit of each of those individual projects and those hundreds of students now serving in various capacities throughout the world as pastors, missioners, Christian educators, children of God are the fruit of my ministry. In the USA, after returning from years overseas, I served in two churches before transferring to extension ministry as a hospice chaplain. I had discovered in my visits to nursing homes and assisted living facilites whole communities of mature Christians who were often unable to travel to a church for worship and Christian fellowship. I helped to establish a non-profit called Community Chaplains Association in which myself and 3 other retired clergy brought Sunday worship, Word and Sacrament, Bible study and Christian fellowship to 6 facilities in Palm Beach County. When I officially retired as an itinerant clergy, I never expected to facilitate a new church start at age 70 but God has a plan and I think a sense of humor. I have the great blessing now to to be helping a new church plant in Port St Lucie, FL - Amazing Grace Sublime Gracia Global Methodist Church with Clergy Supply Pastor Maria Bonilla, as she completes her theological training. My passion to share God's Word, Sacrament, and love has not dimmed through my many years of ministry; if anything, it continues to grow and I hope and believe will continue to bear fruit into the future. A minister of God's Word never truly retires - I believe God just redirects their steps in new opportunities.

I believe God is not done with the Methodist movement, but in fact, calls us to our historic emphasis on Gospel preaching, loving service in the name of Jesus, and intentional discipleship.

# 2. In your opinion, what is the most important thing the General Conference needs to accomplish to be considered as a success?

I believe we will be successful if we resist the urge toward bureaucratic creep. There will be a great temptation for us to ease back into institutionalism, with more requirements and forms and demands on local churches. The denomination must exist only to help local churches in our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ. Our legislation must only go so far as is necessary to ensure we hold to our doctrine and purpose.

# 3. Describe some experiences that will be an advantage to your work as a General Conference delegate.

I believe that my experience in pastoral ministry, helping churches move forward in the ministry of Jesus Christ, is the greatest advantage I offer for the work of General Conference. I served as an associate pastor for 4 1/2 years. I served as Lead Pastor at Deer Lake in Tallahassee for 10 1/5 years. I have been serving as Senior Pastor of FMC of Vero Beach for 8 years.

My 12+ years of experience with the Board of Ordained Ministry and District Committees will be helpful as we continue to build our ordination process.

And I believe my experience serving with the Wesleyan Covenant Association, including as a delegate to the legislative sessions and as the president of our Florida Chapter, has given me insight into the heart of the movement, as well as a sensitivity to this ever-present temptation toward bureaucratic creep. We are a movement of believers, firmly committed to the Lordship of Jesus Christ and the authority and inspiration of Scripture. We care deeply about the lost, and are passionate about sharing the Gospel. These core commitments must continue to be our foundation.

# 4. Describe your passion and fruit for sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

In Acts 26:29, we read, "Paul replied, 'Whether quickly or not, I pray to God that both you and everyone here in this audience might become the same as I am, except for these chains" (NLT). During all of his hardships for the sake of the Gospel, the Apostle Paul continues to declare knowing Jesus to be worth it. He calls knowing Jesus of "surpassing worth." My passion for evangelism comes from that surpassing worth of knowing Jesus. I love him, and I want others to know him as I do. This is what motivates my prayers, my preaching and my personal witness. Jesus is the center of my life and my pastoral ministry. Every sermon, from the New or Old Testament, is about Jesus and his Gospel. I have been privileged to be a part of non-Christian and nominally Christian people being born again. Just recently, God gave us 4 new believers to be baptized at a beach baptism event. Two more youth were baptized after making a decision for Jesus Christ in confirmation class since then. Praise God!

# 1. How do you understand the purpose of the Global Methodist Church?

I was humbled to be one of the three authors of the Transitional Book of Doctrines and Discipline along with Tom Lambrecht and Chappell Temple. I know the book well and where its "holes" are. I've also had the humbling privilege to lead the Florida Conference of the GMC. Every day I work hard to keep our conference lean, nimble, and missional. Lastly, in my former work with the Wesleyan Covenant Association, I had the blessing to build many relationships around the globe giving me a unique perspective on the true global nature of our church.

# 4. Describe your passion and fruit for sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Jesus is the Hope of the World. He is the ultimate solution to all problems. There is not a thing wrong in our world that cannot be fixed by people choosing to follow Jesus. #### 1. How do you understand the purpose of the Global Methodist Church?

I understand the purpose of the Global Methodist Church to be the multiplication of healthy disciplemaking churches in the Wesleyan Christian tradition, with a commitment to orthodox faith and sound biblical teaching. And to see these healthy disciplemaking faith communities joining Jesus in His mission and proclaiming the good news of the Kingdom.

## 2. In your opinion, what is the most important thing the General Conference needs to accomplish to be considered as a success?

To consider how we might spur one another on to love and good works, encouraging one another, and all the more as we see the Day approaching. It is my hope that the GC will see a Spirit-led enthusiasm and resurgence of optimism around our mission, while bringing a sense of unity and order to our doctrines and disciplines.

## 3. Describe some experiences that will be an advantage to your work as a General Conference delegate.

I have served on several commissions and task forces in the WCA (from its inception) and in the GMC in preparation for this General Conference. I currently serve on the Transitional Commission on Evangelism, Mission and Church Planting and additionally am a member of three separate work groups preparing for GC.

I was ordained in 1986 and have served as a successful church planter, and a senior pastor within the UMC, but also as the teaching pastor of a large multi-site church, and the senior pastor of a large inter-denominational church. In the last decade I have served as President/CEO of TMS Global (formerly The Mission Society for United Methodists), and have been engaged with Methodist leaders around the world. I taught "Creative Biblical Communication," "Strategic Leadership for Church Planters in the 21st Century," and "Ministry Practicum" at a large Bible College in Hawaii. And I completed a post-Doctoral degree in Organizational Leadership at the Said School of Business at Oxford University in Oxford, England. All of these experiences have given me a passion for the work of helping to bring a healthy Wesleyan denomination into being, and a somewhat unique skillset and set of experiences that should enable me to serve well and usefully at the GC.

#### 4. Describe your passion and fruit for sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Quite simply, it's all about Jesus. I am a Jesus centric sort of person. I want the abundant life that Jesus said He came to give us, and I believe to the depths of my being that seeking first the Kingdom of God (by fixing our eyes on Jesus, the King of that Kingdom) and His righteousness is the key to that abundant life. But doing so requires joining Jesus in His mission in the world. And that mission (as Jesus clearly stated in Matthew 28:18-20) is to make disciples of all the nations. I share this, honestly, with sadness. But also to say that, from the beginning, joining Jesus in His mission to make disciples has been the core emphasis of my ministry. And the last 10 years have afforded me the wonderful opportunity to not only share in that work around the world, but also to be part of equipping thousands of other women and men to be a part of that work. I can honestly say that being a part of the work of making disciples for the transformation of the world is the primary passion of my life.
